#### **Our Efforts Support...**


What survivors need to overcome abuse.

What communities need to move beyond raising awareness to ending violence before it occurs.



#### **Legal Services**

In 2015, the WCADVSA provided civil legal services in sexual assault, family law, and immigration matters to 132 victims.

#### **Primary Prevention**

In 2015, the WCADVSA helped Northwest College, the University of Wyoming, and Big Horn, Washakie, and Hot Springs County increase their readiness to prevent sexual violence before it occurs. We also launched our "Be the Solution" sexual violence primary prevention campaign.

#### **Transitional Housing**

In 2015, the WCADVSA provided transitional housing for 56 victims of domestic violence and 79 children.

"One of our victims fled an abusive marriage in another state with her four children. She was forced to live with anyone who would take her in. This was not a safe nor positive situation for the family.

With the help of the transitional housing assistance, she found a much better home. Without these funds, she would never have been able to move towards safety, security, and peace of mind. "

#### **Public Policy**

#### Silent Witness

The mission of the Wyoming Silent Witness Initiative is to promote peace, healing and responsibility in intimate relationships in order to eliminate domestic violence. Since 1985, an estimated 66 Wyoming women, 7 men, 4 boys, and 1 girl have been murdered as a result of domestic violence.

#### **Capacity Building**

The WCADVSA staff conducts trauma informed trainings across the state, co-hosts the annual Sexual Assault Summit, provides webinars, and customizes social change trainings for organizations and conferences. In 2015, the WCADVSA staff trained over 1,100 people in Wyoming.

"I'm a school counselor and I work with children who experience trauma in their families. A lot of it is related to poverty and witnessing violence. I use the mindfulness techniques you discussed with my elementary students. I think this is a form of primary prevention. Thanks for helping me make the connection."
